On Tuesday, August 18th, after many years of anticipation, a Master Mason's Lodge was opened in due and ancient form and called from labor. A representation of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas was then opened in due and ancient form by R.W. Donny Broughton, PGM, for the purpose of leveling the cornerstone at Pine Tree Primary School. In the first three degrees, the candidate is asked to become barefoot. Why is this?

Barefoot have several meanings. For example, nakedness of feet is a sign of mourning. God says to Ezekiel, the priest (Ezekiel 24:170) Make no mourning for the dead.... And put on thy shoes upon thy feet.” David is said to have gone from Jerusalem barefoot, when he fled from Absalom.

It is also a mark of respect. In the Koran we find the passage “Surely I am your Lord, therefore put of your

shoes....” The Muslims leave their shoes at the door of a mosque before entering. In Christianity we find that Moses (Exodus 3:5); priests serving in the Tabernacle (a tent sanctuary used by the Israelites during the Exodus) did so with their feet naked, as they did afterwards in the Temple. This is likely what is referred to in our rituals.

The foot is said to represent the soul, as it serves to support the entire body and keep it upright.

One direction Pythagoras gave to his disciples was

terly meeting of the Texas Lodge of Research on Saturday, September 19, in Lufkin.

Tusculum Lodge was chartered in Pine Tree in 1851. The members of the Lodge were responsible for establishing the Pine Tree Presbyterian Church, the Pine Tree Independent School District, and the community. The Lodge

surrendered its charter to the Grand Lodge of Texas in 1881.

Texas Lodge of Research meets quarterly at various locations around the state. Its meetings are tiled meetings and are open to all Master Masons.



“As the operative Mason erects his temporal building in accordance with the rules and designs laid down by the Master upon his Trestle-Board, so should we, both operative and speculative, endeavor to erect our spiritual building laid down by the Supreme Architect of the Universe...”

This portion of the Entered Apprentice Degree lecture lays the foundation for Freemasonry itself. We look at the Great Book of Nature and Revelation as the physical symbol of the ideal that we are given to us by the Supreme Architect. It is the ideal that

we use to establish nations, societies and institutions. If the perception of the ideal that Freemasonry is low, so too will his personal ideal.

God gave the concept of the ideal in our universe to mankind with His light. When God said, “Let there be Light”, He was giving the ideal that we use to all men. We see the ideal all around us in Gods work. This concept of the ideal, of perfection, is clearly delineated in our beautiful and meaningful ritual. We feel the ideal in our hearts through our Masonic Tenets. We seek to understand the ideal

through our study of Masonry and its related subjects of Grammar, Rhetoric, Logic, Arithmetic, Geometry, Music, and Astronomy.

And that it is our duty as Freemasons; to seek the ideal in each of us, and help establish it throughout the realm of mankind. Therefore, the teaching and learning of the several lectures, charges, and most importantly the proficiency examinations are essential to the understanding and establishment of the ideal founded in Freemasonry and sought by every Mason.
